As I sit to write this, I have a whole list of "what's on tops" all vying for space in my wee brain. They range from catering for Sea Cadets, a meeting with Bishop Andrew, Harvest, finding a new fiddle teacher, etc. etc. The list, although diverse, seemed on waking this morning to be more or less behaving itself and then I went to the Co-op!!! And I found myself wandering away from the shop with, and I kid you not, an enormous box of not quite rotten bananas! You can only imagine the expression on Michael's face when I staggered through the front door, (over the years there have been many times when he has thought she's lost the plot...and today was yet another...last week it was the pink hair!)

Now before you say anything...I know that they can be frozen...and they will be turned into banana muffins for the Sea Cadet weekend, (of course this did require a complete restacking of the freezer, and of course questions were asked regarding the contents of wee small packages) however, the whole exercise before 10 am this morning has caused a whole bunch (not a reference to bananas) of thoughts to germinate.

Over the past few weeks it has not just been bananas that have come through the door. great abundance, in a land of great blessing. And so we must be thankful. We are also aware of the needs of our world, and although we may be struggling, we need to remember to be realistic in what we are able to share. I read this week the phrase "we are all one...meaning comes from the lives you touch".... think about it and ask how can you in one small way change the lives of the people around you....share what you have been given especially your ability to smile with another or wipe away a few tears. At this time of Harvest, at this time of thanksgiving let us be truly thankful and demonstrate all that we have been given in many, many acts of kindness.

## St James in 1985

The World: Feb: Mandela rejected offer of freedom from S African govt. Mar: Coal miners ended strike after 1 year. Soviet Premier Chernenko died, Gorbachev to succeed. Michael Redgrave died. Spain and Portugal joined EEC. April: S Africa abolished racial sex laws. May: Tamil violence spread in Sri Lanka. June: Terrorists seized TWA plane over Middle East. Air India jumbo blown up in mid-air. July: Boris Becker youngest to win Wimbledon at 17. Greenpeace 'Rainbow Warrior' sunk in New Zealand. Sept: Titanic wreck found off Newfoundland. Earthquake devastated Mexico City. Oct: Palestinians seized Italian cruise ship 'Achille Lauro'. Orson Welles and Yul Brynner died. Nov: Ronald Reagan and Mikhail Gorbachev met in Geneva. Dec: Philip Larkin died. Poet Robert Graves died.

<u>Also</u>: Live Aid was held in July and raised \$70 million for famine victims in Africa.

In May 56 people died when fire engulfed a wooden stand at Bradford City Football ground. In Tottenham a policeman was hacked to death in rioting. Also in May 41 people died at Belgium's Heysel Stadium in crowd violence before the European Cup final. 25,000 were believed dead when a volcano erupted in Columbia. Artist Marc Chagall died.

Clive Sinclair launched the C5, an electric vehicle run on a washing machine motor and able to travel at 15 mph.

AIDS cases in the USA rose from 8000 to 14,000 in the course of the year.

**1986** would see the Chernobyl disaster, the Gulf War, the 'Challenger' disaster, the US bombing of Libya.

#### Stonehaven

**24**<sup>th</sup> **January:** Dr Steel had erected the wall boards for the kindergarten and the Ladies' Fellowship. The organ had been examined and no serious fault found. The treasurer reported that there had been some tax recovered on the previous year's covenanted subscriptions from April to August amounting to £285. The total income was £4334, outgoings amounted to £2673 leaving a cash balance of £1550.

The Gift Day was to be Saturday, 16<sup>th</sup> February – a letter had been written and was ready to go out. The Rector requested help on that day. There was to be no advert in the papers but it was hoped to have some press coverage.

The lock on the church door needed attention and Mr Emslie agreed to mend it. Mr Hunt had donated a cabinet to display the pewter and this was now in the church.

Due to a change in circumstances Miss Guild could no longer continue to clean the Hall. Mrs Massie had been approached and had agreed to take this on. Miss Guild would still be responsible for the hall diary and bookings.

There was a discussion on identifying the present membership and attracting new members. Some ideas expressed were that each Vestry member be responsible for a number of members; a leaflet could be produced advertising the church and its facilities; and a guide book about the history of the church.

**21**st **February**: The rector would find out at the next meeting of the Stonehaven clergy what would be required if vestry members took some responsibility for church members along similar lines taken by Church of Scotland elders.

Mr Emslie undertook to repair the lock on the Church door. The treasurer reported a surplus of just under £1800. The Gift Day had been considerably more successful than anticipated and the amount received was £2076.

In the hall Mr Emslie would replace the strip lights which were not working. Miss Guild would contact the plumber again about the Gents' toilet.

It was agreed to write to the kindergarten ratifying their lease for the academic year 1985/86.

The rector had compiled a booklet as a Guide Book and hoped it could be printed in time for the summer. Mr Cleall suggested a post-card of the interior of the church and it was agreed that this was a good idea.

Mr Cleall suggested that inadequate heating in the church was responsible for many members not attending.

**28**<sup>th</sup> **March**: The Rector had asked Rev Finch if one of his elders would talk to the vestry about the responsibility required by each member.

The lock on the church door had been mended.

The coffee morning had raised £325. Donations received from the kindergarten amounted to £120.

In the church the internal plasterwork needed attention but nothing could be done until the external work was completed. By contacting the Hydro Board the church could arrange to have off peak heating on during the week if required. The Rector would inquire about the procedure for this. Of the 5 fan heaters in the church only 3 were working and it was agreed to ask Mr Emslie if these could be repaired. He was also asked to check the under pew heating as it was felt these were not working efficiently. Other ideas were put forward to improve the heating – using radiant heaters instead of fans and calor gas heaters for occasional use. It was estimated that it would cost approximately £2,000 to replace the heating system.

Mrs Bella Christie had suggested that the part of the garden used for

burial of ashes be railed off or marked in some way.

The Gents' toilet had been repaired and the lights replaced in the hall. It was agreed that Miss Guild remain responsible for supplies such as soap etc for the hall.

The Rectory front garden wall was in need of attention and the Rector would see to this.

It was agreed to ask hotels and the Community Centre to display the leaflet advertising the church.

**25**<sup>th</sup> **April**: Mr Anderson was looking into a suitable rail for the garden. The leaflets had been distributed to hotels etc and Mark Early had produced a plan of the interior of the church for the guide. Only 28 people had attended the open Ladies' Fellowship evening on 9<sup>th</sup> April.

A letter had been received from the Provost of the Cathedral asking if we could provide refreshments for the visiting delegation from Iowa in June.

A letter from Mrs Mary Christie regarding transfer of money from Alex Christie' estate to improve the heating.

The bill for the external work to the church amounted to £1,121. It was agreed to contact Mr Stephen about cleaning the bell tower and the possibility of fitting external shutters to it.

Some members had complained about the difficulty of hearing what was said in church. It was agreed to pursue enquiries about a new communications system.

As there was some financial provision for heating it was agreed a survey and recommendations be carried out as what should be retained in the existing system. It was agreed to consult Mr Emslie with regard to new systems.

Mr Oliver reported that the key had broken in the lock of the hut. A new lock would be fitted.

Mrs Muir and Mrs Clapp had arranged with the gardener to plant three shrubs in memory of their husbands.

**23**<sup>rd</sup> **May**: Part of the communications system had been removed for testing. As there were already microphones and speakers in the church Johnston Communications felt that these could probably be made to work.

Mr Oliver presented a summary of Income and Expenditure from October 1984 – May 1985. Income - £9894, Expenditure - £9404.

Rates due on the church and Rectory amounted to £386.35. Additional income for specific projects - £2177, £5000 for structural repairs and heating.

The advantages and disadvantages of various heating systems were discussed and Mr Oliver was asked to pursue and obtain the best package appropriate to the building and funds available.

It was agreed that the kindergarten could erect a shed alongside the church hut to store their equipment. Concern was expressed about the use of outside equipment by the kindergarten. It was agreed to look into this.

It was agreed that the Rector and treasurer would decide on the printing and costs of the Guide.

Mrs Rench said she thought the slides of St James should be updated as those shown in a recent slide presentation of 'Churches of the Brechin Diocese' had been disappointing.

The Rector had prepared a framed list of clergy of St James from disestablishment to the present day to be displayed in the church. The Rector had received a letter from the Scottish Churches Architectural Heritage Trust about a steeplechase to take place in July. Pairs of young people would try to see as many church steeples as possible from Orkney to Dumfries. If arrangements could be made for someone to be available to stamp a participant's card then the Rector would reply that our steeple could be added to the list.

A letter from Fr McAtamney about the possibility of using St James for services with large numbers was broached but it was found that normally times of such services would conflict. The matter was left open for discussion.

Mrs Rench said because of declining membership the Ladies' Fellowship would appreciate more help from the congregation especially at fund raising events.

October 8<sup>th</sup> at 7pm Granite City will be returning for a concert. There will be a raffle and a retiring collection.

November 18<sup>th</sup> at 7.30pm sees the return of the Rock Choir. There will be a raffle. Tickets for this event will be £10. This will include a glass of wine.


